

Emergency Anaphylaxis Management Protocol

For Classroom, School Yard, Excursions and Camp

1. General Preparation (Applies to All Settings)

1.1. Individual Medical Plans

- Each student with anaphylaxis must have an ASCIA Action Plan signed by a medical professional.
- Ensure the plan and up-to-date emergency contact information are accessible.
- Identify known allergens and avoid exposure (e.g. food restrictions, insect awareness).

1.2. Medication and Equipment

- Each student must have at least one in-date adrenaline autoinjectors (e.g., EpiPen, Anapen):
 - o One stored in a central, clearly labelled First Aid/Emergency Kit.
 - One may be carried on the student (age-appropriate) or kept with the classroom teacher.

1.3. Staff Training

- All staff trained to:
 - Recognise signs of anaphylaxis
 - Use adrenaline autoinjectors
 - Respond calmly in emergencies
 - Apply basic life support (CPR)

2. Emergency Response – Quick Reference Table

Location Action Summary

Classroom Teacher calls first aid/office to bring autoinjector immediately, Nurse or

teacher administers autoinjector, calls 000 or asks another staff

member to, lays student down, monitors

School Yard Yard duty teacher uses a mobile/runner to alert the office/first aid, nurse

or first aid officer will bring and administer the autoinjector immediately.

Excursion/Camp Nearest staff administers EpiPen, calls 000, notifies leader, triggers

3. Recognising Anaphylaxis Symptoms

Mild to Moderate Symptoms

- Swelling (face, lips, eyes)
- Hives, itchy skin
- Abdominal pain or vomiting (especially insect allergy)

Severe Symptoms (Anaphylaxis)

- Difficulty breathing, wheezing
- Swelling of tongue or throat
- Dizziness, collapse, or unconsciousness
- Hoarse voice or persistent cough
- Pale and floppy (young children)

4. Step-by-Step Emergency Procedures

A. IN THE CLASSROOM

- 1. **Recognise symptoms** check the student's ASCIA plan.
- 2. Call First aid or office to bring the autoinjector
- 3. Administer adrenaline autoinjector immediately.

- 4. Call for help: Use classroom phone or mobile to call 000.
- 5. Lay the student flat (or in the recovery position if unconscious).
- 6. **Monitor breathing** and prepare a second EpiPen if needed.
- 7. Record:
 - o Time of injection
 - o Student's name
 - Observations to give to paramedics
- 8. Call parents/guardians after an ambulance is on its way.
- 9. Stay with the student until paramedics arrive.
- 10. Complete incident report after event.

B. IN THE SCHOOL YARD

- 1. **Recognise symptoms** and check alert status.
- 2. Call First aid or office to bring the autoinjector
- 3. Administer adrenaline autoinjector immediately.
- 4. Alert other staff:
 - Use mobile phone, or send a runner to Call 000
- 5. Lay the student flat in a safe area.
- 6. **Monitor and prepare a second EpiPen** if symptoms persist after 5 minutes.
- 7. Office/staff to:
 - Escort ambulance to student
 - Notify parents/guardians
- 8. Complete incident report after event.

C. ON EXCURSIONS & CAMPS

- 1. **Recognise symptoms** act according to ASCIA plan.
- 2. Administer adrenaline autoinjector (student's or backup).
- 3. Call 000 immediately give exact location (e.g., "Camp Name, Cabin X").

- 4. Notify camp leader or teacher-in-charge.
- 5. Lay the student flat (don't allow to walk or stand).
- 6. **Monitor closely**, give a second autoinjector if no improvement in 5 minutes.
- 7. Staff to:
 - Meet ambulance
 - o Call parents/guardians
- 8. Complete post-incident documentation and review.

5. After Any Anaphylaxis Event

- Ensure the **student is always transported to hospital by ambulance**, even if they appear to recover.
- **Do not leave the student unattended** at any stage.
- Notify parents/carers as soon as possible.
- Complete a full incident report and debrief with all involved staff.
- Replace used adrenaline autoinjectors as soon as possible.
- Review and revise the student's medical plan if necessary.

6. Roles and Responsibilities

Role	Responsibilities
Nurse (10:30-2:45) Teacher (other times)	Immediate first responder, administers autoinjector
First Aid Officer	Provides support, monitors student, liaises with paramedics
Office Staff	Calls ambulance (if not done), contacts parents, supports
Principal/Leader	Oversees response, ensures protocols are followed
Other Staff	Clears space, supervises others, relays communication

7. Emergency Equipment Checklist

☐ Laminated ASCIA Action Plans (classroom, first aid room, student's medical boxes)
